Beautify Your Home Through the Neighborhood Fix-Up Grant Program

The City of Commerce is bringing back the Neighborhood Fix-Up Grant Program! This popular program provides financial assistance to residents for minor improvements to their homes. Residents must qualify based on income guidelines and those that are eligible will be placed in a lottery. Applications are available now at City Hall and all four branch libraries. Residents must meet eligibility criterion and provide all documentation to the Planning Division by January 15, 2016 to be entered in the first lottery. The Neighborhood Fix-Up Grant will be an ongoing program and applications will continue to be accepted for subsequent lotteries.

The Program provides funding for the cost of materials associated with eligible residence exterior upgrades that are visible from the street or public right of way. The Program may also assist with some improvements that are not visible from the public right of way or street, but only if they are tied to an improvement which is visible (e.g., fence, windows, etc.)

“Over the years, the Neighborhood Fix-Up Grant Program has proven to be successful in revitalizing residential areas within the City,” said Maryam Babaki, Director of Public Works and Community Development. “The Program has made a significant visual impact in the City’s neighborhoods and has brought about great improvements within the community.”

Grants of up to \$2,000 every 2 years may be awarded to income-qualified residents.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

- The dwelling unit must be located within the City of Commerce boundaries.
- Only 1 application will be accepted per property.
- Gross household income must not exceed 120 percent of Area Median Income for Los Angeles County, as defined annually by the California Housing and Development Department (HCD).
- The Program will only cover material costs for eligible exterior repairs or alterations that are visible from the street or public right of way (e.g. paint, stucco, fence, door, windows, etc.). The Program may also assist with some improvements that are not visible from the public right of way or street, but only if they are tied to an improvement which is visible (e.g., fence, windows).

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS ARE:

- Household Income Qualification: Applicant must provide supporting income documentation for all household members 18 and over.
- Proof of tenancy (Copy of current gas, water, or electric bill).
- Property owner consent (applicable to renters).
- Qualified applicants will be placed in a lottery.
- Before and after pictures of your home will be taken by staff.
- Applicant must submit receipts to the City’s Planning Division and must be no older than 6 months from the date printed on your Fix-Up Grant. The reimbursement process will take approximately 4 to 6 weeks from the date of receipt submittal.
- Households must be within the maximum income limits.

SUBMIT THE FOLLOWING DOCUMENTATION TO THE CITY’S PLANNING DIVISION:

- A completed Neighborhood Fix-Up Grant application (only 1 per property).
- Copy of Driver License, California ID or school ID for all members of the household.
- Income Tax Return (1040 Form) for all members of household 18 and over.
- The last 3 paycheck stubs, SSI or Pension statements for all members of household 18 and over (last 3 bank statements if direct deposit).
- “No-Income Certification” form must be submitted for all unemployed members of household 18 and over (if applicable).
- Copy of current gas, water or electric bill.

Commerce Swimmers Pick Up Medals at Junior Olympics

Last month, the Commerce Aquatics Swim Team traveled to Palm Springs to compete in the three-day Southern California Short Course Younger Junior Olympic Championships. Casey Barragan (12), Bianca Becerra (12) and Alexsa Gimenez (10) qualified to compete and represent Commerce.

There were 736 swimmers from 53 Southern California teams that competed in prelims and the top 16 qualifiers in

each event returned at night to compete in finals.

As usual, Commerce did very well and all three of our athletes received top honors. Casey Barragan placed 14th in the 50 Breast. Bianca Becerra placed 13th in the 50 Free, 6th place in the 200 Free, and 3rd place in the 500 Free. Alexsa Gimenez placed 9th in the 50 Free and 100 Individual Medley, 8th place in the 100 Backstroke, 5th place in the 200 Individual Medley, 2nd place in the 100 Fly and 1st place in the 100 Free. Congratulations to our outstanding athletes!





RECYCLING YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

The holidays have come to an end and it is time to remove the wonderful smelling, live Christmas tree that has been in our living room for the past few weeks. The National Christmas Tree Association recommends not throwing away real Christmas trees in the trash because they are biodegradable, which means they can be easily reused or recycled for mulch and other purposes.

Commerce residents can recycle their trees by simply placing it in the green waste container at the curb on your regular recycle trash day. The tree must be small enough to fit in the green waste container with the lid closed. CalMet will collect Christmas trees December 26 – January 15.

After January 15th, residents must schedule a bulky item pick up by calling 562.259.1239. Trees must be clear of all décor and lights and if over 4 ft tall, the tree must be cut in half (no need to bundle). Flocked trees cannot be recycled and should be placed in your refuse container for disposal. And never burn your Christmas tree in a fireplace or wood stove.

HERE'S A TIP: The best way to avoid a mess when removing your tree is to place a plastic tree bag (available at hardware stores) underneath and pull the bag up around the tree, stand and all, and carry it outside. Obviously, you will want to remove the stand before recycling the tree. If some needles do scatter inside, it is better to sweep them up as needles can clog vacuum cleaners.

New State Tax Credit 2015

Benefits Low Income Families



California is now offering an Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) for working low-income families and individuals starting with calendar year 2015 tax returns. In addition to the federal EITC, the new state Earned Income Tax Credit will put more money in the pockets of those who need it most. The CA EITC is "refundable," meaning that you will receive a refund if the amount of the credit is greater than the tax you owe. It is available to California households with adjusted gross incomes of less than \$6,580 if there are no qualifying children, less than \$9,880 if there is one qualifying child, or less than \$13,870 if there are two or more qualifying children.

QUALIFICATIONS:

- You must file a state tax return, even if you do not owe any tax or are not otherwise required to file.
- You must have earned income from W-2 wages, salaries, tips, or other employee compensation subject to California withholding. (For the CA EITC, earned income does not include income from self-employment.)
- You, your spouse, and any qualifying children must each have a social security number issued by the Social Security Administration that is valid for employment.
- You must file using the single, married/registered domestic partner (RDP) filing jointly, or head of household filing status. The "married/RDP filing separately" status may not be used.

YOU MUST:


- Meet the rules for those without a qualifying child or have an individual that meets all of the qualifying child rules for you or your spouse if you file a joint return.
- Your principal residence must be in California for more than half the tax year.
- Both your adjusted gross income and earned income (defined above) must be no more than:
 - \$6,580 if there are no qualifying children.
 - \$9,880 if there is one qualifying child.
 - \$13,870 if there are two or more qualifying children.
- Your investment income, such as interest, dividends, royalties, and capital gains cannot exceed \$3,400 for the entire tax year.
